Session 1: Introduction and Start of the Week Briefing

The inaugural session was hosted by Dr Mengxi Peng, the Global Academic Engagement Manager, Philanthropy and Global Engagement (PAGE). Dr Peng welcomed all the participants and gave a brief introduction of the program & London School of Economics (LSE). The session concluded with each participant introducing themselves.

Session 2: GAE Director's Welcome Address

This session was delivered by Dr. Brenden Smith, Director of Global Academic Engagement (GAE) at the London School of Economics (LSE). Dr. Smith also serves as the Director of LSE-East Asia, leading the division's engagement in the region. He provided an overview of GAE and Philanthropy and Global Engagement (PAGE), LSE's largest division, which supports collaborative teaching and research on global issues.

Session 4: Research and Innovation Session

This session was delivered by Grace McConnell, Deputy Director of Research & Innovation, and Nathalie Van Der Elst, Senior Research Culture Manager of Research & Innovation. They discussed how this division creates and sustains opportunities for LSE to conduct world-leading social science research, maximizing its quality, reach, and impact. The division operates in a blended way,

combining on-campus and remote working, and comprises six teams that support research-active staff.

Session 1: Workshop on Higher Education Teaching Trends

This session was delivered by the team from the LSE Eden Centre. The Eden Centre team consisted of Dr. Claire Gordon (Director of Eden Centre), Dr. Akile Ahmet (Head of Inclusive Education), Ms. Stella Ekebuisi (Head of Digital Education Futures), and Dr. Alex Standen (Head of Academic Development). The Eden Centre serves as a proactive, developmental centre of education expertise at LSE, supporting academic staff development, curriculum enrichment, and digital innovation.

Session 2: GO LSE and General Course

This session was delivered by Professor Mark Hoffman, Dean of the General Course and Global Mobility. Prof. Hoffman's role involves supporting General Course students, ensuring they have the necessary guidance and resources to succeed both personally and academically. Go LSE is an acronym for Global Opportunity LSE. GO LSE exchange programs are organised in coordination with the partner institutions of LSE around the world and allow students to study abroad as part of their UG degree. This program is open to LSE students studying at any one of the global partner institution. The General Course is LSE's study abroad program, which has 300 UG courses available and allows students from oversees universities to spend a full academic year at LSE. The General course student can choose from a range of more than 300 available courses in social science subjects and has an access to a range of resources including the world renowned British Library of Political and Economic Science. After completing this program, these students will have a range of benefits as an alumnus of LSE.

Session 3: LSE Campus Tour

Ms. Avika Bhattacharya, a current postgraduate student at LSE and also the GAE Special Project Officer, conducted this LSE campus tour. The tour provided a comprehensive introduction to the vibrant environment and extensive resources available to students at LSE. The campus is a Mix of historic and contemporary buildings, reflecting LSE's rich heritage and forward-thinking approach and there are wide range of facilities and amenities including Libraries, study spaces, research centers to support student life and academic pursuits. The students also have are separate spaces for students for social engagement and extracurricular activities.

Session 4: GAE Session

Ms. Linda Earl and Ms. Helen Rosemont, members of the Global Academic Exchange (GAE) team, conducted this session. Oliver Trumble, Head of the University of London Programme, and Ms. Erika Gallacher, Senior Business Development Manager, conducted this session. They introduced participants to a model where the University of London's Undergraduate programs in Economics, Management, and Social Sciences are offered in distance learning mode with academic direction from LSE. LSE provides academic direction to this program in the following ways:

- Curriculum Development
- Providing Learning Recourses
- Assessment
- Progression of Students

This model is flexible and has two methods of study. Students can enrol in a program through recognized teaching centres, benefiting from teaching support, peer interactions, and a campus culture. Alternatively, they can opt for the online mode, completing their degree with a mix of independent learning and online sessions. Graduates become part of the University of London Alumni network and are also valued members of the LSE community, regardless of their chosen study method.

Session 2: LSE Careers Sessions

Ms. Vanessa Doust, Head of Employer Engagement, and Mr. Lewis Humphreys, Careers Education Manager, conducted this session on LSE Careers. The mission of LSE's Careers department is to facilitate the transition from education to employment and equip students with the skills necessary for a successful career. They help students and alumni explore and achieve their career goals by providing access to work-based learning interventions and facilitating crucial connections. The team collaborates with employers, alumni, academic departments, professional services, and

students to deliver comprehensive career services. They provide career education and advice, arrange seminars and workshops, offer operational support including event organization and website management, and assist alumni with early career planning for up to five years after completing their course, facilitating their engagement with current students.

Session 3: Student Recruitment

This session was conducted by Rachel Cox, Head of Student Marketing and Study Abroad at LSE. The "Student Recruitment & Study Abroad" division provides information, guidance, and support to prospective students. It comprises subdivisions for Home and International recruitment, as well as Outbound & Inbound Study Abroad. Data on recruitment for India in Undergraduate (UG), Postgraduate Taught (PGT), and Postgraduate Research (PGR) programs was shared, showing the following figures for the years 2019/2020 to 2023/2024:

This data reflects the recruitment trends over the past five years for Indian students across different levels of study at LSE.

Session 4: Reception

A reception session was attended by Professor Larry Kramer, LSE President, and Professor Lord Nicholas Stern, IG Patel Professor of Economics and Government, Chairman of the Grantham Research Institute, and Co-Director of the LSE India Observatory. The dignitaries were facilitated by Dr. Vikas Gupta, Registrar, University of Delhi. Dr. Gupta expressed gratitude to the LSE team for their impeccable arrangements, hospitality, and efficient conduction of the program.

DAY 4:

Session 1: Academic Representatives

This session was delivered by Dr. Mukulika Banerjee, Associate Professor and Inaugural Director of the South Asia Centre; Dr. Rohan Mukherjee, Assistant Professor and Deputy Director of LSE IDEAS; and Dr. Nilanjan Sarkar, Deputy Director of the South Asia Centre.

Dr. Banerjee started the session by discussing her authored books, including "The Unarmed Pathan"

about the Khudai Khidmatgar movement during India's freedom struggle and "The Sari," highlighting its significance for women in terms of self-control. She also spoke about her recent book "Cultivating Democracy," emphasizing the continuous effort democracy requires. As a Political Anthropologist, Dr. Banerjee has published five books and is an alumnus of the University of Delhi.

Dr. Rohan Mukherjee then discussed IDEAS, the LSE Foreign Policy Think Tank, which bridges academic knowledge with diplomatic and strategic practice. IDEAS hosts innovative research projects and offers a one-year Executive Master's in International Strategy and Diplomacy.

Dr. Nilanjan Sarkar focused on the LSE South Asia Centre, which engages with countries like Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka. The Centre curates platforms for exchanging ideas, creating knowledge resources, and influencing policy and public thought.

The session highlighted LSE's commitment to connecting academic knowledge with practical diplomacy and strategy, fostering impactful research and engagement in the South Asia region.

Session 2: Workshop on Higher Education Communications

Sarah Coyle, Deputy Director of Communications, and Hayley Reed, Senior Brand Communications Manager, conducted this workshop. The Communications division plays a crucial role in advancing strategic priorities through leading and coordinating internal and external communications at LSE. The Internal Communication focuses on staff. and student communication, as well as change management initiatives. The External Communication involves promotion, engagement, and reputation management through media relations, public affairs, social media, blogs, and events to profile LSE globally. This division is also manages LSE's brand, produces content, and oversees digital platforms. It also works to build the profile and credibility of LSE researchers and research and supports effective engagement to create impact opportunities.

Session 3: Summer School

This session was conducted by Professor Emma Trubowitz, Academic Director of Summer School and Professor of International Relations and Director of the Phelam US Centre. This session provided an overview of the Summer School at LSE. Established in 1989, LSE Summer School offers courses from a diverse range of disciplines such as business and management, accounting, finance, Law, economics, international relations and more. These courses are created and taught by LSE faculty and are designed to give the same learning experience as the full time courses.

Session 4: Vice President (Research) Welcome

Professor Susana Mourato addressed the participants in a welcome session, where she was also

felicitated by Dr. Vikas Gupta, Registrar of the University of Delhi. Dr. Gupta expressed gratitude to Professor Susana for conducting this program for the faculty of Delhi University and expressed hope for more such programs in the future.

Day 5:

Session 1: LSE Student Union

James Relf, General Secretary of the LSE Student Union (LSESU), conducted this session, explaining the vital role of LSESU in supporting LSE students and enhancing their experience at the university. The union organizes various society events, campaigns, and fundraising activities to benefit students. It also collaborates with LSE Careers to create new career opportunities for undergraduate students. The student community at LSE enjoys dedicated spaces for growth and development, including new gyms and music practice rooms. LSESU members are represented by elected trustees, part-time officers, and full-time sabbatical officers, including the General Secretary, who, along with other student officers, ensures that student voices are heard in the university forums.

Session 2: Workshop on University Rankings

Gary Barclay, Head of Planning, and Sarah Hagart, Senior Planning Officer, conducted this session focusing on the significance of League Table rankings at LSE. These rankings serve as indicators of a university's prestige, reputation, and quality, influencing various stakeholders such as prospective students, parents, staff, funders, donors, and alumni. The impact of rankings can be observed in areas like student recruitment, graduate employability, alumni engagement and fundraising, academic staff recruitment, educational and research partnerships, corporate and policy engagement, and access to funding and credit. LSE has maintained its position as the top university in London and fourth in the UK in the Guardian's Best UK University 2024 League Table. These rankings consider factors like staff-student ratio, career prospects, and engagement in reputation surveys. Data shared during the session highlighted LSE's strong performance across individual disciplines, particularly in accounting and finance where it had topmost ranking.

Session 3: Alumni Centre Tour

Avika conducted a tour of the Alumni Centre at LSE during this session. Participants were guided to the Alumni Centre, situated on the ground floor of the central building. This space serves as a hub for alumni to unwind, engage in learning activities, and reconnect with fellow alumni. It features a dedicated working area and a meeting room equipped with essential AV facilities, accommodating up to ten people. The tour provided valuable insights into the university's commitment to providing alumni with dedicated spaces within the campus.

Session 4: Reflections and Certificate Session

This valedictory session marked the end of the program, with participants receiving certificates from LSE Vice President Professor Emma McCoy. Professor McCoy addressed the participants, sharing reflections on the program's achievements and significance. Dr. Vikas Gupta expressed gratitude to LSE for the successful culmination of the program. A high tea was arranged for the participants, providing an opportunity for more informal discussions. The session concluded with a group photograph of all the participants with Professor McCoy, commemorating the successful completion of the program.

(Capacity Building Programme at London School of Economics June 3-7, 2024)

The Capacity Building Programme at London School of Economics started on 3rd June 2024. The first session was addressed by Dr. Mengxi Pang and she gave an overview about the Lobal Academic Engagement at LSE. The second session was taken online by Dr. Breden Smith about the details of Philanthropy & Global Engagement. The third session on Alumni Engagement was addressed by Dr. Sophie Cope. Grace McConnel and Nathalie Van der Elst talked about Research and Innovation at LSE in the fourth session. They emphasized the role played by these techniques for enhancing the reputation of LSE.

4th June 2024

Dr. Claire Gordon, Dr. Akile Ahmet, Stella Ekebuisi and Dr. Alex Standen emphasized the role of inclusive education, Digital education and Academic Development. Prof. Mark Hoffman informed about the General Course and Global Mobility to make LSE an excellent institution.

5th June 2024

Oliver Trumble and Erika Gallacher explained about University of London programmes. University of London is the degree awarding institution for LSE. LSE is responsible for academic part of the programme. In countries like India, Teaching Partners are identified locally by LSE. They offer courses on accounting, International Relations, Economics, Data Science and Business Management. There is an option of single as well as two separate/parallel degrees. LSE also runs summer courses, General courses and Master's courses. Distance education degree is only awarded by University of London.

In the second session on 5th June, Vanessa Doust and Lewis Humphreys informed about employer's engagement and career education. About 12000 students study at UG and PG level and are well diversified. The career advice, interview preparation, and remedial assistance services are offered to students. Career department also gives advice on graduate internship and skill sets required for

such offerings. It also takes feedback from employer about the progress of the students in their assigned role.

Rachel Cox explained about student recruitment. AT LSE about 161 Indian students study at LSE, 448 at PG level and 34 at Post Graduate level in 2023-24. LSE is facing challenge of falling enrolment of students at PG level. Its rival, US is witnessing increase of intake at PG level. Fees for UG domestic students are regulated, whereas for PG fees is being increased by LSE. This has led to drop in PG international students.

6th June 2024

Dr. Mululika Banerjee, Dr. Rohan Mukherjee and Dr. Nilanjan Sarkar delivered lecture on functioning of South Asia Conter at LSE. One of themes of research is- When nations are developing, they tend to follow international order. However, when they getequality recognition, they behave differently; There is common perception that in rural areas, voters can be bribed to vote for candidates. However, they behave rationally.

In the second session on 6th June, Sarah Coyle and Hayley Reed deliberated on Communication strategy and practice. Communication centres around Internal (students, staff) engagement, Promotional engagement (blogs and events), Brand Management (Films & Studios) as well as Digital (website). The Commination Strategy involves building Brand, developing brand ambassador, create impact opportunities, civic engagement, and networking. LSE is constantly identifying effective communication like philanthropy. Also improving internal experience through excellent communication is being pursued. LSE is striving to build, engage, purposeful content rich channels like LSE website, Podcasts, Blogs, and Films.

The third session on 6th June was taken by Professor Peter Trubowitz on Summer School. There are about 7000 students from 110 countries taking Summer Courses. LSE has six university partnership in India. The last session involved Reception at Anthropology building and the delegation was received by Professor Larry Kramer, LSE President and Professor Lord Nicholas Stern, IG Patel Professor of Economics and Government.

7th June 2024

The first session on last day was addressed by James Relf, LSE Student Union's General secretary. Union leaders take off for one year to serve on Union and serve the students. There are 300 clubs and societies. There are about 10 events organized by each society making about 3000 events in total. There are about 10 staff members assisting student union. There is no political involvement. Student Union fights for the cause of students and help fund raising for financial week students.

The second session on 7th June was on University Rankings and was taken by Gary Barclay and Sarah Hagart. LSE participates in QS ranking as well as Times Higher Education ranking. Resource

person informed about the efforts taken by LSE to improve its ranking amongst global institutions. There were about 18 Nobel Laureates who were served LSE.

A tour of Alumni center was organized by LSE followed by distribution of certificates by Vice President (Education) Professor Emma McCoy.

The training session ended with exchange of pleasantries.
