
University of Delhi





The University was Established in 1922 as a Unitary Teaching and Residential University by an Act of the Central Legislative Assembly

The motto of the University of Delhi inscribed on the logo, "Nishtha Dhriti Satyam" translates to English as "dedication, steadfastness and truth". The elephant represents wisdom and sagacity. The lotus flowers are for art and beauty and the open book is about learning and knowledge. The curved parallel lines below the lotuses and the open book represent the river Yamuna which flows through the city of Delhi.

The resolution to adopt the logo was passed on April 23, 1949, and the motto was adopted on March 30, 1950.

The colour of the University is royal purple.

From the Desk of the Vice-Chancellor

ts matter of great joy and pride that our University has completed 100 years of excellence in 2022, and we are celebrating centennial year. This momentous occasion is a testimony to the dedication and hard work of everyone who has been a part of this institution. The University has made remarkable progress in teachingresearch, academics, learning, cultural activities, sports, and more. We have achieved numerous milestones on our journey and have become one of the leading universities in India.



As we gear up for the 99th convocation, I am thrilled to announce that 170 medals

and prizes will be awarded to 119 female and 51 male students. In addition, 1,57,290 (54.7% Female and 45.3% male) undergraduate and postgraduate students and 47 DM/M.Ch. students will be receiving their degrees. I extend my heartfelt congratulations to all the graduating students and their proud parents on this special day.

I am also pleased to inform you that the University of Delhi has set a new record by awarding the maximum number of Ph.D. degrees in a year. This year, 840 Ph.D. students (56.7% female and 43.3% male) will receive their degrees, surpassing the previous year's record of 802.

During the centenary celebrations, as a special gesture University gave a "Centenary Chance" to all such students who could not get their degrees due to various reasons. I am happy to inform you that in the "Centenary Chance" examination till date, 8,683 students have applied for the centenary exams, making them eligible for an undergraduate/postgraduate degree from the University of Delhi. Remarkably, a 77-year-old alumnus has applied under this special chance, thereby becoming the oldest alumnus of the University desiring to obtain his degree.

Our faculty members have been involved in cutting edge research and as per Scopus database, the University of Delhi has published total 62,131 publications till date and in last one-year University has published 6444 research papers. We have also witnessed a 9% increase in research papers published in Scopus Indexed Journals. The h-index of the University has increased to 252, which is the highest among Indian Universities. Additionally, the University has been granted six patents in the last year. To further fuel research, 200 research projects have been approved by the Institute of Eminence (IoE) of the University and released the grant to the tune of 7.5 crore.

Another milestone been the admission to undergraduate courses through Common University Entrance Examination (CUET), which provided a level playing field to all applicants coming from different Boards, positively impacting the diversity of students in every college and enhancing the peer learning process.

University has successfully implemented National Education Policy and as a part of NEP we have introduced more than 200 interdisciplinary courses, above 100 skill enhancement courses, 24 value addition courses, and 22 languages in the Eighth Schedule of the Constitution. These courses have been formulated under the Undergraduate Curricular Framework (UGCF) 2022, based on the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.

During last one year as many as 5635 teachers have been promoted and 1,013 new appointments have been made in the colleges and departments of the University. Efforts to strengthen the administrative branch have also been made with 521 MACP cases, 249 promotions, and 82 appointments in the colleges and departments of the University.

We are also excited to annouce the introduction of new academic programs such as MBA, BBA(FIA), BMS, BLISO, and MLISO by the School of Open Learning, Campus of Open Learning. The University is rolling out the Competence Enhancement Scheme soon, which will enable anyone of any age to register in a course and study without having to enroll in a program.

To continue on this trajectory of excellence, we have planned many new infrastructure projects that will be initiated this year. We have also registered two section 8 companies, Delhi University Foundation and Udhmodya, to provide impetus to innovation and increase the endowments, respectively. We look forward to the contributions of our illustrious alumni in taking their alma mater to new heights.

Finally, I extend my heartfelt congratulations to all the students who shall be conferred degrees and extend a warm welcome to all to the 99th Annual Convocation of the University.

The Growth Journey

he University of Delhi is a premier University of the country and is globally recognized for its high academic standards in teaching and research. It was established in 1922 as a unitary, teaching and residential University by an Act of the then Central Legislative Assembly. The President of India is the Visitor, the Vice - President of India is the Chancellor and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of India is the Pro -Chancellor of the University. Ever since its inception, a strong commitment to excellence in teaching and research has made the University of Delhi a rolemodel and path-setter for other universities in the country. At the time of its inception the University had two faculties - Arts and Science, and only three colleges in Delhi affiliated to it with a student strength of 750. The three colleges were: St. Stephen's College founded in 1881, Hindu College founded in 1899 and Ramias College founded in 1917. The Delhi College (Zakir Hussain College) is the oldest college in Delhi, started in 1792. In 1929, the gate which Lord Lake had demolished was rebuilt and was raised to the status of a degree college in 1934. The college suffered badly

during partition in 1947, but started again in 1948 under its old name Delhi College. In 1975 it was renamed Zakir Hussain College. In a meeting held on July 26, 2010 Zakir Husain Memorial Trust unanimously resolved to rename the college as Zakir Husain Delhi College in order to retain a sense of historical continuity.

St. Stephen's School founded by the Rev. M. J. Jennings had been in existence since 1853 in a hired house in Katra Kushal Rai, Chandni Chowk in a building called Sheesh Mahal. In 1885, St. Stephen's College introduced B. A. degree and Makhan Lal was the first student.

Ramjas College started in 1917 in Anand Parbat which was purchased by its founder Rai Sahib Kidar Nath. Ramjas was an intermediate college to begin with and became a degree college in 1934.

The Commercial High School started under the trust set up by Lala Shri Ram. It was raised in 1926 to the standard of an intermediate college and in 1934 to a post graduate college. Its name was changed to Shri Ram College of Commerce in 1951.

The story of University of Delhi begins in 1911, when Emperor King George V, announced to transfer capital of India from Calcutta to Delhi. It was felt that the Imperial capital should have a University of its own, to begin with the government thought not of a University but a government



college. In 1918, a committee consisting of Principal S. K. Rudra of St. Stephen's, Principal N. V. Thadani of Hindu, A. T. Gidwani of Ramjas and Wali Mohammed was constituted which submitted its report on constitution of such a college.

Later on, the Delhi University Bill was referred to a Joint Select Committee consisting of seven members of the Council of States - Raja Harnam Singh, A. I. Mayhew, Ganganath Jha, Julfikar Ali Khan, Bhugri and Lalubhai Samaldas with the education member, Muhammad Shafi as Chairman. The Delhi University bill was introduced in the Imperial Legislative assembly on January 16, 1922. The members of the Legislative assembly were Hari Singh Gour, D. P. Sarbadhikari, Abdul Qasim, J. P. Kotelingam and Henry Sharp. The report of the committee was presented to the Legislative Assembly on February 13, 1922 and later to Council of states.

The Delhi University Bill was passed by the Assembly on February 22, 1922 and council of states on February 28, 1922. The Viceroy gave his assent to the Bill on March 5, 1922. It aimed at the establishment of a unitary teaching and residential university which was to be under the control of the Government of India, the Viceroy being the Chancellor. A Vice-Chancellor was to be appointed by the Chancellor. The general bodies would be a court, an executive council and an academic council. After discussion with the Principals of the colleges the Governer-General-in-Council directed that the Act should come into force on **May 1, 1922** and a notification of this effect was issued on April 6, 1922. The existing colleges were to retain their names and the power of appointing their staff but the university was given the power of recognizing staff members of colleges as University teachers.

Honorary degrees were conferred on Lord Reading, Mohammad Shafi and Hari Singh Gaur in the first convocation of the University held on March, 26 1923 at the legislative assembly.

Trials for the Delhi Assembly Bomb Case were held at the Viceregal Lodge. Bhagat Singh was pronounced guilty on June 12, 1929. It is commonly believed that Bhagat Singh was kept in the dungeon-like basement of the Viceregal Lodge, in a windowless room, strongly guarded before being condemned to death.

It is a marked group photo of the Convocation of 1948, the first one after Independence, attended by Jawaharlal Nehru, Lord and Lady Mountbatten, Rajkumari Amrit Kaur, Abul Kalam Azad, Zakir Hussain, S. S. Bhatnagar and others.

Twenty-five years later, the golden jubilee celebrations of 1973 were attended by the then Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi, Satyajit Ray, Amrita Pritam and M. S. Subbulakshmi.

This University, which started on May 1, 1922 with 750 students and only three colleges, has become a prestigious University of the country and the world. Today there are over 6 lakh students, 90 colleges, 16 faculty and thousands of teachers in DU. This university, which started with a budget of 40 thousand, has today reached a budget of more than 838 crores.



100 Years of the University: Milestones 1922-2022

- 1922: The Delhi University bill was introduced in the Imperial Legislative Assembly on January 16, 1922 and passed on Feb 22, 1922 and came into force on May 1, 1922. The Viceroy, Lord Reading was the first Chancellor, Sir Hari Singh Gour was the first Vice Chancellor, Sir Muhammad Shafi was first Pro-Chancellor, G. M. D. Sufi was the first Registrar, F. J. Western was the first Rector and K. C. Roy the first Treasurer. There were 2 faculties (Arts and Science) and eight departments (English, History, Economics, Sanskrit, Arabic, Persian, Physic and Chemistry).
- 1922: Academic Council, admission committee and finance committees were formed.
- ➤ 1922: The Delhi University Library started with a collection of 1380 gifted books.
- 1923: The first convocation was held in the Legislative Assembly Hall on March 26, 1923.
- > 1924: The faculty of Law was established.
- ➤ 1924: The first girls' college Indraprastha college was founded.
- ➤ 1925: The old Delhi College was revived as Anglo-Arabic College and got affiliated with the University of Delhi. It was renamed Zakir Husain College in 1975.
- ➤ 1926: The Commercial College with intermediate classes started, it became a degree college in 1930 and name changed to Shri Ram College of Commerce in 1951.
- 1932: Lady Irwin college was inaugurated by Lady Willington and Mrs Hannah Sen as its first director.
- > 1933: The Viceroy Lodge was handed over to DU.
- > 1935: The executive council adopted federal structure of the University.

- ▶ 1938: Sir Maurice Gwyer was appointed Vice Chancellor.
- > 1939: Foundation stone of new building of St Stephen's College was laid by C. F. Andrews in the presence of Sarojini Naidu, Rajkumari Amrit Kaur and Mahadev Desai.
- ➤ 1942: V. K. R. V. Rao of economics was appointed the first full-time Professor at the University, followed by D. S. Kothari in Physics.
- > **1942:** Department of Fine Arts and College of Art were established.
- > 1943: Introduction of the 3 years degree courses in the University B. Sc (Honours) and M. Sc classes were started.
- 1943: An ordinance constituting the Non-Collegiate Women Students was passed. After the establishment of the University of Delhi in 1922, an amendment of the Delhi University Act in 1943, Women students were enabled to give examinations with special coaching but without attending regular classes. This gave shape to the NonCollegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB)
- > 1945: Delhi University Teachers Association (DUTA) was constituted.
- 1946: Started the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) Department of social work. In 1950 the name was changed to Delhi School of Social Works.
- > 1947: University celebrated its Silver Jubilee.
- 1947: Jubilee Hall was founded on the occasion of Silver Jubilee of the University. The hostel was first started in the barracks near Science Faculty of University.
- 1947: Central Institute of Education (CIE) was started, under NCERT. In 1973 CIE was transferred from NCERT to DU. The Department of Anthropology, Botany, Mathematics and



- Zoology at the University of Delhi were established.
- 1948: Special convocation was held on March 7, 1948 honorary degrees were conferred on Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru, Lord Mountbatten, Dr. Zakir Hussain, Maulana Azad, John Sargent and Raj Kumari Amrit Kaur.
- > 1948: Hansraj college and Miranda House college were established.
- > 1949: Sardar Vallabhai Patel laid the foundation stone of All India Tuberculosis Institute, now known as Vallabhai Patel Chest Institute.
- > 1949: The Delhi School of Economics was set up and Sir V. T. Krishnamachari as its first Chairman.
- > 1949: Delhi University Students Union (DUSU) was inaugurated by Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru.
- 1950: On the March 30, 1950, the Executive Council adopted the current Logo of the University and the motto 'Nishtha Dhritih and Satyam' suggested by Mahamahopadhyaya Lachhmi Dhar Kalla.
- > 1950: Department of Home Science was established.
- 1952: Departments of Hindi, and Political Science were established.
- > 1953: Department of Philosophy established.
- ➤ 1954: Department of Business Management and Industrial Administration established.
- > 1955: The Department of African Studies was established.
- > 1955: World University Service (WUS) health Centre came into existence.
- 1957: Department of Buddhist Studies was established.
- > 1958: The institute of Economic Growth (IEG) was founded by Dr. V. K. R. V. Rao.
- > 1958: The present central library building

- was inaugurated by Dr. S. Radhakrishnan on December 1, 1958.
- > 1959: Department of Urdu, Sociology, and Geography were established.
- > 1959: The Delhi University Music, Arts and Drama Society (DUMADS) started.
- > 1960: The faculty of Music and Fine Arts was established.
- 1961: The Delhi University Press was acquired. Department of Modern Indian Languages and Literary Studies was established.
- > 1962: The school of correspondence courses was started.
- > 1962: The School of Open Learning (formerly School of Correspondence Courses and Continuing Education) was established in the year 1962 under the University of Delhi.
- > 1964: The Delhi University Women's Association (DUWA) was established.
- > 1966: Department of Geology was established.
- 1967: Department of Commerce was established.
- Planning, Civil Engineering, and Electrical Engineering were established.
- > 1971: University College of Medical Sciences (UCMS) was established.
- > 1972: Golden Jubilee year of the University was celebrated.
- > 1972: Department of Homeopathic Medicine and Department of Pharmacy established.
- 1973: The South Campus was established with the initiative of the then Vice-Chancellor, Prof Sarup Singh with Prof Amrik Singh as its first Director.
- 1973: Departments of Ayurvedic Medicine, Unani Medicine, Statistics, and Operational Research were established.



- 1975: Institute for the Physically Handicapped, renamed as Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Institute for the Physically Handicapped in 2002, and further renamed as Pandit Deendayal Upadhyaya National Institute for Persons with Physical Disabilities (Divyangjan) in 2016.
- 1976: Adult & Continuing Education Cell was set-up, upgraded as Centre for Adult, Continuing Education & Extension in 1982, and became a full-fledged Department in 1985.
- > 1977: National Institute of Health & Family Welfare was established.
- 1981: The Tibia College of Unani Medicine was established.
- > 1983: Department of Electronics and Communication Engineering was established.
- 1984: Departments of Bio-Chemistry, Genetics, Microbiology, Applied Sciences, and Humanities established.
- ➤ 1984: University Science Instrumentation Center (USIC) was established in 1984 with the support of UGC and Indo-Japanese grantin-aid.
- > 1985: Departments of Punjabi, Electronic Science, Bio-Physics, and Computer Engineering were established.
- > 1987: CPDHE was established.
- 1987: Women's Studies and Development Centre of Advanced Study (WSDC), University of Delhi, was established.
- 1988: Departments of Germanic and Romance Studies, Slavonic and Finno-Ugrian Studies, and Plant Molecular Biology were established.
- > 1991: Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Center for Biomedical Research (ACBR) was established.
- 1995: In honour of Professor Kothari the University of Delhi has established the D. S. Kothari Centre for Science, Ethics and Education.

- 1997: The Institute of Informatics & Communication (IIC) was established.
- > 1998: Department of Production and Industrial Engineering was established.
- > 1999: Amar Jyoti Institute of Physiotherapy was established.
- 2002: School of Rehabilitation Sciences was established.
- 2005: Department of Physical Education and Sports Sciences was established.
- 2006: Durgabai Deshmukh College of Special Education and Maulana Azad Institute of Dental Sciences founded.
- 2007: Institute of Life Long Learning (ILLL) was established.
- 2011: The University's flagship programme, Cluster Innovation Centre (CIC) was established.
- 2012: "B.Tech. Humanities" in five streams (Journalism, Education, Historical Tourism, Art & Design, and Counselling) was started through the Meta College concept.
- 2012: In ninety years of its history, the University of Delhi celebrated its Foundation Day for the first time on May 2, 2012.
- 2013: Software Technology Park of India (STPI) signed an MoU with Delhi University on January 20, 2013 to set up Technology Parks at the Cluster Innovation Centre.
- 2017: The Delhi School of Journalism was established.
- 2020: The Ministry of Education (MoE) issued a notification on March 2, 2020 declaring the University of Delhi as an "Institution of Eminence."
- **2022:** Commencement of the Centenary Celebrations of the University.



Overview of the University

he University of Delhi is a premier University of the country. It boasts of a venerable legacy upheld by the most distinguished academicians, researchers and administrators. The President of India is the Visitor, the Vice-President is the Chancellor and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of India is the Pro-Chancellor of the University. The vision and mission of the University foster its long-term commitment to nation building and an unflinching adherence to universal human values. The values of the University are reflected in its motto: 'Nishtha Dhriti Satyam' (Dedication, Steadfastness and Truth). The University was established in 1922 and the Vice Regal Lodge Estate, built in 1902, was handed over to the University of Delhi in 1933.

In 1962, the Academic Council resolved that the University Seal would consist of a white ring with the name of the University and the University motto in black, the elephant and the lotus flowers would be in gold, the river in Cambridge blue and the book in white.

In 1943, the University was given federal structure with the colleges as its constituent units. During the 1950s, many colleges were shifted to the main (North) campus and many new colleges (including evening colleges) were started. Management education was started at the Delhi School of Economics, Health Centre was set up by the World University Service (WUS) and the Central Library building was inaugurated by Dr. S. Radhakrishnan. Between 1960 and 1970s, many new colleges for women came up, apart from establishment of Faculty of Music and Fine Arts. The 1970s saw the transfer of teaching of science honours courses from University departments to selected colleges, the establishment of the University College of Medical Sciences and the starting the full time MBA program under Faculty of Management.

In the early 1970s, the University initiated the multi-campus concept with the main (North) campus concentrating on basic disciplines in the domain of Arts, Sciences, Social Sciences, Mathematical Sciences and others like Law, Music, Education, Languages, Management and Distance Education, and the South Campus offering teaching and research programmes with an inter-disciplinary and applied orientation in areas such as Biochemistry, Biophysics, Biotechnology, Electronic Sciences, Financial Studies, Genetics, Informatics, Management Studies, Microbiology and Plant Microbiology. In the 1980s, two new and innovative centres – Women's Studies and Development Centre and Centre for Professional Development in Higher Education were established.

During 1990–2010, ten new colleges were established with full funding provided by Government of NCT (Delhi), three separate Institutes for Nursing, Physiotherapy and for Rehabilitation Studies were accorded recognition by the University, Biotechnology Park at South Campus and Campus of Open Learning at North Campus were established. The Yamuna and Aravalli Biodiversity Parks have been set-up with the help of the DDA and many new facilities were created like, state-of the art conference centre, an International Guest House, separate new building to house Mathematical Sciences, Social Sciences and Multidisplinary University Centres.

During the decade of 2010–2020, the University added many meritorious dimensions to its teaching- learning and research accomplishments. The University's flagship programme, the Cluster Innovation Centre was established for offering - B. Tech./BS Innovation with Mathematics



& IT and B. Tech. Humanities in five streams, viz. Journalism, Education, Historical Tourism, Art & Design, and Counselling, through the Meta-College concept.

Over the years, the University has shown phenomenal growth. As of now, it comprises 90 Colleges, 16 Faculties, 86 Departments, 23 Centres and 3 Institutes. It offers 540 programmes, which include Undergraduate, Masters, M. Phil., Ph. D., Certificate and Diploma programmes.

A strong commitment to excellence in teaching, research and social outreach has made the University a role-model for other universities in the country. With the aim of emerging as a world leader in education and research, the University offers a diversity of well-structured educational programmes taught by distinguished faculty; a wide range of co-curricular activities; and a productive and creative work ethos. The educational programmes of the University are widely acknowledged for their innovative teaching-learning pedagogies and modern infrastructural support. Its strong commitment to excellence in research is evident from publications in the highest-ranking peerreviewed international journals, high h-index and the total number of publications. In its pursuit to nurture high quality research, the University has established well-equipped laboratories, central instrumentation facilities, computational infrastructure and allied services. In recognition, the University has received highest University grants like DST-PURSE; grants from UGC-SAP/CAS and DST-FIST; and more than 300 individual extramural research projects. The University runs an Electropreneur Park and Technology Business Incubators to encourage translational research, entrepreneurship and employment. There are about 90 functional MoU's with institutions of national/international importance. The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) had conducted the process of assessment and accreditation of the University in 2018 and has been accorded A+ grade with a cumulative grade point average (CGPA) of 3.28.

As part of its outreach activities, the University has also implemented diverse social development initiatives that actively promote socio-economic upliftment and rural community development. Faculty members of the University are renowned leaders in their field and have been honored with many prestigious civilian and academic awards and fellowships, such as Padma Shri, Visitor Award for Innovation, Fellowships of Science Academies. 



National Education Policy (NEP) 2020: UGCF 2022

he University of Delhi has been the torch bearer in expanding the academic horizon and raising the bar of academic standard in the country. Keeping up with this tradition, the University has implemented the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020), a policy aimed at changing the academic landscape of education system of the country.

The NEP 2020 aims to overhaul the education system in India right from preschool to the doctoral level. The University has framed a structure for the implementation of NEP at the undergraduate level which is called the Undergraduate Curricular Framework 2022 (UGCF).



The UGCF embeds the various fundamental aspects of NEP and maintains a uniform credit system throughout the eight semesters.

The UGCF is student centric and attempts to give maximum choices and flexibility to students to develop their own academic paths. It has made provision for slow and fast pace learners. The structure of UGCF and the syllabi prepared under it are meant to provide in-depth knowledge in one or more disciplines, multidisciplinary and holistic education along with the skills of 21st century.


The NEP 2020 envisages Internship, apprenticeship, projects and community outreach have been made an integral part. The conventional separation of arts and science, curricular &



extracurricular and academic & vocational have been broken down to ensure holistic education. Students who have got admission in 2022-23 to the University and its colleges through a common entrance exam (called CUET) have been administered the first semester of the syllabi prepared under UGCF 2022. To provide more hands-on learning, the University has framed more than hundred skill enhancement courses for the students of the first year of the undergraduate programmes. These skills, which includes both soft skills and technical skills, are expected to enhance the capabilities of the students and raise the employability.

The NEP 2020 envisages imparting life skills as well as technical and professional skills as part of holistic education. University of Delhi has prepared various Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) in different domains to provide kinds of skills to the student, such as Communication skills, Computer related skills, Coding skills, financial management skills, etc. with higher degree of hands on learning so as to equip them with the skills of their choice suitable to the academic path they choose.

The Value Addtion courses (VAC) Seek to full fill the mandate of providing holistic education to the students and introduce them to the rich heritage of the nation as well as to important social concerns of the current time, which will help them to adjust in learning and living. A student who pursue any under graduates programme in the university and its colleges is offered a pool of VAC and SEC courses, from which he has to choose one.





Admissions: Common University Entrance Test (2022)

he vision and mission of the University have been duly incorporated in the expanse and diversity of academic programmes and students enrolled. It offers Undergraduate programmes offered by colleges of the University, an array of Postgraduate programmes (including Masters, M. Phil. and Ph. D.) and Certificate and Diploma courses.

In the academic session 2022-23, the University of Delhi decided to admit students to its Undergraduate programs only through the Common University Entrance Test (2022) conducted by the National Testing Agency. Close to 7 lakh candidates expressed their desire to study in University of Delhi, while filling the CUET form of NTA. After the conduct of CUET, the candidates aspiring to take admission in the Under-Graduate programs in the University applied through the Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS) which was launched on September 12, 2022.



In the Three-Phased process of CSAS, the candidates were required to fill the CSAS 2022 application form, conduct subject-mapping of the subjects studied by them in Class XII with the ones appeared in CUET, provide preferences for the programs and colleges in which they would join the University if allocated as per their merit score. The allocation policy under the CSAS was widely inclusive, transparent, and fair as it was based solely on the preferences submitted by the candidates, their category, merit, and availability of seats. Candidates were auto upgraded, if opted for it, to their better preferences in subsequent allocation rounds. Provision for Mid-Entry for the candidates who missed applying to the University within the stipulated time was also given to students.

Approximately 176,221 candidates applied to the University of Delhi through its Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS 2022). A total of 3 regular and 4 Spot Rounds of Common Seat Allocations were done. Through these 7 rounds, a total of 139,474 allocations were offered in various programs of the University, wherein 65225 candidates secured admissions; among these there were 34259 Females, 30965 Males, and one candidate from Other gender. This year, candidates who got admissions covered a wide range of examination boards from across the nation; a majority of them from the Central Board of Secondary Examination.

Admissions to postgraduate programs of the University of Delhi were also successfully completed for the academic sessions 2022-23 through Entrance and Merit modes. A total of 201437 candidates had applied for admissions to 76 PG Programs in various Departments of the University. A total of 23,923 candidates were shortlisted through multiple rounds of allocations and finally close to 11,279 candidates took admissions.



Examinations and Assessment



entenary chance examination: During the centenary year celebration of the University, Executive council resolved that one chance to be given to those who could not complete their degrees within given span period. Total 8683 ex-students applied for the centenary examination chance and ex-student of 1973 was the oldest student who applied for the examination.

The University has started portal for online submission of Ph. thesis wherein all the stakeholders including students can track the status of evaluation of their thesis. The next pioneering initiative has been the introduction of an online mechanism for accepting applications for the issuance of transcriptsmaking this process totally hassle-free.

Now examination branch has moved to **Samarth portal**, where the direct and hassle-




free process of submission of examination fees led to an increase in the direct revenue of the University. Examination branch developed a mechanism by which all pass out students are being issued printed degrees immediately after the convocation.

Examination branch of the University introduced a **digital degree** concept in 2021, and released 1.78 lakh digital degrees in the 97th convocation followed by 1.73 lakhs digital degree in 2022 in the 98th convocation and in 2023 University will be releasing over 1.53 lakh digital degrees. University created a record by Awarding **802 Ph. D** degrees in a year during 98th convocation held in 2022.



The Examination Branch of the University has created history in the difficult times of COVID-19. Justifying its student-centric approach, it held **Open Book Examination** (OBE) from August 2020 to March 2022 which required a minimal level of internet facilities and declared all UG results in record 28 days' time in 2021.











Release of Digital Degrees for the First Time (1,78,989) in the 97th Annual Convocation




Open Book Examination (OBE) Evaluation Team with the Honourable Dignitaries



DU Library System

he Delhi University Library System (DULS) is a manageable combination of physical and virtual collection and its associated information services. While on the one hand, the traditional system of library holdings is maintained, on the other hand, ICT based services are implemented. With 33 constituent library units, the DULS is accomplishing its task of reaching to the wider academic community. It has advanced out web activity with the subscription of high-quality electronic databases being made available through the Delhi University Campus Network to teachers, students and research scholars. Among these, many databases are accessible through the UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium. DULS also promotes open access e-resources. The DULS continues to support research, academic and teaching needs of students and teachers of the University and colleges affiliated to the University.

DU eLibrary web platform: It serves as a single window access to eBooks, eJournals, eThesis, Video lectures, expert talks, etc. It has inbuilt remote access facility and mobile app to support information requirements of the academia, anywhere, any time and through any device.

- > **Similarity verification**: Central Library has been entrusted with the task of similarity verification.
- Purchase of eBooks: To support online teaching learning and research, DULS has procured a good number of eBooks. It is accessible on University's IP range, through VPN as well eLibrary platform.
- Subscription of databases: DULS subscribes databases of reputed publishers like Oxford University Press, American psychological association, Elsevier Science, J-Store etc. Through these subscriptions many eJournals, citation analysis tools, thesis and reference sources are accessible to support research and other academic activities.



Placement & Internship Opportunity (UG/PG Levels)

In order to bridge the gap between industry and academia, University of Delhi has set up a Central Placement Cell in 2008 under the aegis of the Dean Students Welfare Office. 

Ministry of Education (MoE) Programmes

Vidya Vistar Scheme

he University of Delhi took up a special initiative named *Vidya Vistar* (V2) Scheme for developing academic cooperative bonding between universities and colleges which are situated in remote areas of the country. The aim of this scheme is to enable higher educational institutions to contribute to nation building by acting as a catalyst for faster growth of educational institutions through optimum utilization of existing resources and potentials.





The main objectives of V2 Scheme are:

- Organize online/offline lectures, workshops, trainings, meetings and other such programmes aimed at capacity building of the faculty members of both the institutions. To the extent possible, visits of faculties will be facilitated for this purpose.
- The teachers and researchers of the partner colleges or partner departments of the two universities can engage in joint research activities and they can be co-investigators in the research projects submitted to funding agencies.
- Facilitate joint publication by teachers/researchers of the University and the selected colleges and University Departments.
- Sharing of library resources for providing support and conducting capacity building programmes of the faculty of the partner institutions for improvement of their teaching and research skills.
- To forge mutually beneficial linkages with its partners through various platforms such as Cluster Innovation Centre, Electropreneur Park etc. so as to initiate and assist innovation activities and boost start-ups.
- To cultivate the feeling of brotherhood among the youth of the two institutions through sports and extracurricular activities.

The bonding envisaged under V2 Scheme is based on the principle of mutual respect, cooperation and sharing between the two colleges of the universities as equal partners. Such symbiotic relation between the two shall enrich both the academic institutions in more ways than what each could achieve solitarily.

EK Bharat Shrestha Bharat

'Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat' (EBSB) introduced by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi during the Rashtriya Ekta Divas held on October 31, 2015, to commemorate the birth anniversary of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. This includes the sustained and structured cultural connect between people of different regions. Cultural diversity is a heritage that ought to be celebrated through mutual interaction & reciprocity between people of different States and UTs so that a common spirit of understanding resonates throughout the country. Enthusiastic participation was noted by the University. Several Colleges participated in different activities such as 'Pariksha Pe Charcha' by Indraprastha College and 'Bujargo ki Baat - Desh ke Saath' by Ramjas College. 'Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat' unit of Deshbandhu College organises activities to promote a sustained and structured cultural connect in the areas of language learning, culture, traditions, music, tourism, cuisine and sports with the North East Indian States.

Unnat Bharat Abhiyan

The university took proactive measures towards the flagship programme of MHRD 'Unnat Bharat Abhiyan' (UBA) with the objective to enrich rural India. The University takes immense pride in spearheading the work of the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Initiative of the MHRD. The mandated mission of Unnat 'Bharat Abhiyan' is inspired by the vision of transformational change in community



development processes by leveraging knowledge institutions to help build the architecture of an Inclusive India. The Department of Social Work is playing a lead role organising community based developmental activities on an ongoing basis and is assisted by other departments from time to time. Janki Devi Memorial College held the Workshop on Mental Health Awareness. Indraprastha college for women created awareness through the 'Nashe Se Mukt Bharat' program and also participated in FiT India Movement. Ramjas college, under UBA, organized 'Sahaja Yoga workshop' in Government Sarvodya Bal Vidyalaya, Kamalpur, Burari Delhi. Deshbandhu college adopted six villages Bhati, Sulatnpur, Rajpur Khurd, Chandan Hola and Satbari.

Swachh Bharat Abhiyan

Hindu College, Indraprastha College, Deshbandhu College, Institute of Home Economics, Jesus and Mary College have organized a series of activities under the 'Swachhta Pakhwada.' Indraprastha College for Women, has adopted a model of sustainable waste management. Institute of Home Economics under the Swacchta Sarthi Fellowship Scheme, Government of India participated in 'Waste to Wealth Mission' and 'Historical Monuments Cleanliness' drive. Janki Devi memorial College has been certified as the Swacchta Action Plan Institution by the Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education (MGNCRE), Ministry of Education. JDM college has organised Hygiene workshop, Poster making and Slogan writing competitions. Different colleges also practice Water Management and Waste Management activities throughout the year.









Multidisciplinary Research Accomplishments



University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC)

USIC is a central facility and houses sophisticated analytical instruments. Its main objective is to provide services to all researchers and students of science departments in the University and the constituent colleges of the University. Facilities for carrying out spectroscopic, thermal, chemical and microstructural analysis on a variety of materials are extended to all researchers. A centralized liquid nitrogen distribution facility is maintained for all science departments, and all requests for customs duty and excise duty exemption for imported items are processed. Training programs and workshops/seminars are organized regularly for laboratory staff and research scholars in focused areas of materials characterization and analysis.

Central Instrumental Facility (CIF) at South Campus

This facility provides high-quality service, innovative solutions, and cutting-edge technologies in Genomics (Genotyping, Sequencing, Real-Time qPCR), Proteomics (LCMS, UPLC, CD Spectrophotometry), Imaging (Confocal Microscopy, Scanning Electron Microscopy and Laser Dissection Microscopy), and Flow Cytometry. Besides serving the University faculty to run their in-house projects, the facility also provides analytical support to academic users from outside the University system at nominal pricing.






Institution of Eminence (IoE)





Best Practices of the University

UDHMODYA Foundation: A Section 8 Company

The University reverberates the call for Atmanirbhar Bharat made by our Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi. Following his guiding vision to make India self-reliant taking the National Innovation and Startup Policy (NISP) as a guiding framework for Higher Education Institutions (HEI), UDHMODYA Foundation, a Section 8 registered company, has been established to promote innovation and entrepreneurship (I& E) related activities. UDHMODYA is governed by the Board of Directors headed by the Vice Chancellor of the University of Delhi. UDHMODYA manages all innovation & entrepreneurship programmes, activities and initiatives and mainly follow two verticals approach which are academic learning and support for innovation & entrepreneurship activities.

University of Delhi Foundation: A Section 8 Company

The vision of the University of Delhi Foundation is to build the endowment for the University of Delhi for it to be an internationally acclaimed university, recognised for excellence in teaching, research and outreach; provide the highest quality education to students, nurture their talent, promote intellectual growth, and shape their personal development. The Foundation has been created with the primary objective of building and supporting the Delhi University Endowment Fund of the University of Delhi, through mobilising donations, funds, subscriptions and contributions from individuals, well-wishers, alumni, philanthropists, associations, institutions, business fraternity, industries, and corporates. The mandate of the Foundation is to promote interaction among the alumni, students, and well-wishers of the University through organising reunions of the alumni, seminars, meetings, lectures, discussions, conference, study tours and other academic pursuits to carry forward the brand and promoting the values of the University.

Competence Enhancement Scheme

The University has launched a new scheme called the Competence Enhancement Scheme (CES) in its centennial year to make higher education more accessible, as envisaged under the National Education Policy 2020. The Scheme shall provide opportunities to people from all walks of life to enhance their knowledge/competence by registering for any one or two courses offered in a semester in the Colleges and Departments of the University. Such candidate shall get the flavour of studying in the University along with the regular students of such course(s) without having to enroll for a Programme of study. The number of seats per course prescribed is a maximum of 10% of the class size of such course and these seats are treated as supernumerary seats. Those who fulfil the eligibility criteria and pre-requisites, if any, of a course are eligible to apply for such course. Registration to a course is based on merit and shall be valid for a semester. A candidate may register for a maximum of two courses or eight credits in a semester. The teaching learning of these students shall be along with the regular students and the mode of evaluation are same as that of the regular students of such course. On successful completion of the course, a candidate shall be awarded a certificate and credits so earned shall be deposited in his/her Academic Bank of Credit.

International Students

The Foreign Students Registry launches its admission portal globally every year in February. This launch allows students from various countries to put up applications for over 100 courses from Undergraduate to Ph. D. levels. The FSR also provides an incentive to promote Hindi language among overseas students by offering courses in Certificate/ Diploma and Advanced Diploma format. The FSR portal has unique facility to apply and upload all sorts of related documents, videos and recommendation letters which help us in determining the



placement of overseas applicants at prominent Colleges and Departments. The University also permit those whose final qualifying results are not yet out. Their admission is processed on the basis of the available results of previous semesters. The Indian Embassy and Diplomatic Missions are reached out to encourage students from those countries to apply for admission in the University. The ICCR is a major component of sending scholarship holders to the University of Delhi. It plays a major role in providing students from over 50 countries. In total, the FSR caters to the academic needs of students from 85 countries at our various Colleges and Departments.

VC Internship Programme

'The University has started the 'Vice Chancellor Internship Scheme'(VCIS) from the academic year 2022-2023 with an aim to provide internship opportunities to its students in the University which will help them to understand the working of different sectors of the University system in particular and official functioning in government set-ups in general. Through this Scheme, the students shall be able to contribute to their University and develop better understanding of the policies and be the ambassadors of the University. The Interns are provided honorarium not only as an incentive but to meet their daily expenses in discharge of the responsibilities entrusted to them. In the first cycle of the Scheme, 3424 applications were received, from which 113 interns were selected and are now currently engaged 27 branches/sections of the University, thus providing the much needed exposure and experience to these students.

Samarth: Transforming Higher Education Through e-Governance

"Samarth" project was initiated by the Ministry of Education in 2019 with an aim to enable the universities and Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) towards planning, management, delivery, and monitoring of services for students, staff, and other stakeholders through a digital framework. Through Samarth, the University has been able to conduct online admission and recruitment process since 2019-20. Over 3 Lakh Students of Delhi University received their secured digital degrees at convocation of University of Delhi in 2021 and 2022. During COVID-19 Pandemic, Samarth project enabled the University of Delhi to conduct Online Open Book Examination (OBE) and online evaluation. Over 10 Lakh students took online open book examinations conducted from 2020 to 2022.

Campus of Open Learning: Education for the Masses

Campus of Open Learning (COL) and Department of Distance and continuing Education (DDCE) formerly known as the School of Correspondence Courses and Continuing Education, was established under the University of Delhi in 1962, as a pioneering Institution in the field of Distance Education in India. This is the first institution of India which caters students in Distance learning Mode. It provides opportunities for lifelong learning with an emphasis on equipping the students with appropriate skills which will prepare them for service and leadership in a diverse community. The COL firmly believes in the transformative power of education and strives to function as a catalyst to build a developed India by blending modern education and technology with traditional values.

Financial Support Scheme (FSS) for Students

The University of Delhi celebrates diversity and is deeply committed to holistic and inclusive education. Understanding the need for affirmative actions as mandated in the Constitution of India and to extend the benefits of equity, access and quality with excellence, both in letter and spirit, to the financially weaker students, it has initiated a financial support scheme for such students through a fee waiver in the spirit of the Government's motto "Sabka Sath Sabka Vikas". The fee waiver includes all components of fee paid by students except examination fee & hostel fee.


