### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between

### University of Delhi Ministry of Education (MoE) and University Grants Commission (UGC) And

### New Delhi for 2021-2022

This is a Tri-Partite Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) being signed among Ministry of Education (MoE) and University Grand Commission (UGC) and

the third party, University of Delhi (hereafter referred to as such or the University)

With the objective to assist, assess and facilitate the performance of the University of Delhi on selected key parameters against the targets set so as to incrementally improve the performance of the University, in accordance with the Delhi University Act, 1922 (as amended), Statutes and Ordinances.

This MoU has been structured into four parts:

- Part 1: Vision, Mission and Objectives
- Part 2: Exercise of Enhanced Autonomy and Delegation of Financial Powers
- Part 3: Facilitation/Assistance from the Government/UGC
- Part 4: Action Plan for implementation and Monitoring of the MoU
- Part 5: Requirement from UGC and MoE

### PART-1 VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

#### 1.1 Vision

To be an internationally acclaimed university for teaching and research, producing and nurturing lifelong inspired learners, who are empowered to be successful leaders of tomorrow in service of the society.

### 1.2 Mission

To provide the best-quality education to students regardless of their socioeconomic background, nurture their talent, promote their intellectual growth and shape their personal development. Known for the highest academic standards, the University of Delhi offers a congenial academic environment to the brightest students and an outstanding faculty. Given its illustrious past, the University's inspiring present holds the promise of an exceptional future for its stakeholders.

### 1.3 Objectives

The objectives of the University under the tripartite agreement are as follows:

- 1.3.1 To remain at the forefront of higher education that provides affordable and accessible quality higher education to the best and the brightest regardless of their socio-economic profile.
- 1.3.2 To endeavour to maintain an academically desirable faculty-student ratio and offer an excellent learning experience to the students with an emphasis on interactive teaching-learning activities.
- 1.3.3 To remain steadfast in the pursuit of high-quality research by continuously raising academic standards and producing high-quality publications through increased engagement with the government/industry for sponsored research grants.
- 1.3.4 To increase the capacity of employable/skilled graduates to meet the growing demands of the national and international markets and the society at large.
- 1.3.5 To make all possible efforts in improving the quality of life of our people, help bring social harmony, economic prosperity and engage productively with the communities in and around the University through various outreach activities/programmes.
- 1.3.6 To contribute to the growth and development of our national economy, enrich our national intellectual capital and significantly invest in the nation-building through producing competent, emotionally resilient and socially sensitive professionals.

### PART-2 EXERCISE OF ENHANCED AUTONOMY AND DELEGATION OF FINANCIAL POWERS

2.1 The Executive Council of the University of Delhi shall exercise all such powers as are provided for by the Act, Statutes and Ordinances framed thereunder.

- 2.2 The University of Delhi shall endeavour to continue to charge and revise fees for its various courses and facilities, keeping in view the need to make quality higher education accessible to the poorest of the poor in this country and also from African, Asian and Latin American countries.
- 2.3 The University of Delhi shall follow the General Financial Rules (GFR), issued from time to time by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance and Government of India in all its financial transactions, including procurement of goods and services. The University shall additionally endeavour to adopt best practices in all its financial transactions which are in accordance with GFR.
- 2.4 The University of Delhi shall adopt the Public Financial Management System (PFMS) for receipt of all funds from UGC/Government of India and make all payments through the PFMS. The University shall additionally endeavour to adopt best practices for receipt of funds from UGC/Government of India and make all payments through the PFMS.
- 2.5 The University of Delhi shall send to the MoE and the UGC any information required by them to satisfy any requirement related to Parliamentary Matters, RTI, Court Cases, Public Grievances or inputs to policy decisions as required/sought by the UGC/MoE within a reasonable time.
  - In addition to the above, any such decision which creates additional financial liabilities on UGC/MoE beyond the approved funding shall be taken up by the University with the prior approval of UGC/MoE. At the same time, the University of Delhi may take new initiatives to achieve greater excellence by mobilising resources on its own.
- 2.6. The University of Delhi shall undertake necessary steps to achieve a certain level of academic/administrative performance annually. The performance will be assessed by a Committee constituted for this purpose by the Executive Council, based on the information provided as per the criteria listed in the Annexure enclosed.

### PART-3 FACILITATION/ASSISTANCE FROM THE GOVERNMENT/UGC

- 3.1 The University of Delhi shall strive to achieve Performance Evaluation Targets based on certain assumptions in respect of the release of grants from the Government/ UGC.
- 3.2 UGC/ MoE will extend to the University any other facilitation assistance like taking up matters with the State Government/Municipal Corporation/

Local Bodies or any Ministry of the Union Government, as and when required in furtherance of the objectives of the University.

### PART-4 ACTION PLAN FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING OF THE MoU

- 4.1 Performance evaluation against these MoU parameters shall be carried out every six months by the Committee constituted by the Executive Council and monitored by the University in the format annexed herewith. An interim report shall be placed before the Executive Council on a sixmonthly basis and the final report shall be placed before the Executive Council at the end of each year.
- 4.2 The performance evaluation so carried out shall be submitted to the Executive Council during the Executive Council meetings for its approval and recommendations. The approved report shall be sent to UGC along with its recommendations if any.
- 4.3 A joint review by the University of Delhi, UGC and MoE shall be carried out within 180 days of completion of the financial year. The outcome of the joint review shall be placed before the Executive Council and displayed prominently on the website of the University. The UGC will also review the performance of the departments created during last three years in the University.

### PART-5 REQUIREMENT FROM UGC AND MoE

The University and its various institutions shall be provided regular financial support in terms of an annual maintenance grant as projected by the University. In addition to this, the University shall be provided with the following as per existing guidelines of GOI subject to availability of funds:

- 5.1. Funding for infrastructure development like Academic Buildings for existing and new programmes, staff housing, Visiting Scholars' home, International Guest House, Hostel facilities for national and international students (both Men and Women), etc., as per existing guidelines of GOI subject to availability of funds.
- 5.2 Recurring grants for research laboratories (equipment, contingent expenses and maintenance), library resource expansion, including online journals, up-gradation of computational facilities, Wi-Fi Connectivity, including VPN facilities, up-gradation of central instrumentation facilities with State-of-the-Art equipment, etc., as per existing guidelines of GOI subject to availability of funds.

- 5.3 Funding for the subscription of journals on a regular basis, which is an integral part of a higher education system. UGC/MoE may provide a centralized system of online access to journals to the University.
- 5.4 Financial support for recurring expenditure for research scholarships, research support to the faculty members, including support for publication costs, conference participation (national and international), organizing seminars, conferences, special lecture series, etc., as per existing guidelines of GOI subject to availability of funds.
- 5.5 The University shall put up the budgetary requirements as recommended by the statutory bodies of the University for approval, sanction and release by MoE/UGC with due justification.

This is made possible through exclusive women's colleges and mon-(i) Women students collegiate women's education board (NCWEB). The current figure of 49% in the University Departments and an overall figure is around 54% in the UG/PG courses for women students testifies this fact. The University attracts students from almost all the Indian states. The share of students from other states in our current student population stands at (ii) Students from other states 60%. The admission process of the University is online to provide wider access to the regional diversity of India. The current international student population share in the University is 1.58%. This is a rather low figure and does not do justice to our international (iii) International students academic standing, but what is heartening is that these international students come from as many as around 80 world nations. The University has a dedicated international student cell, namely the Foreign Student Registry (FSR) to cater to the needs of the overseas students. The University and FSR officials constantly engage with various diplomatic missions to coordinate foreign student admissions. However, despite our best efforts, the limited seats in the existing hostels deter more girl students, students from other states and nations from seeking admissions in the University. Therefore, University proposes to build more hostel facilities for such students.

With a focus on strengthening student-teacher ratio, the University has initiated in all earnestness the faculty recruitment process. Our current student-faculty ratio stands at 1:27, but once the advertised vacant positions are filled the ratio will significantly improve to 1:14.

The University has 1706 sanctioned regular faculty positions (Assistant Professor, Associate Professor and Professor).

At present 821 sanctioned regular faculty positions are filled. The University is in the process of filling up vacant 885 regular faculty positions.

The current share of vacant strength of the faculty is 51.8%. Serious efforts are on to fill these vacancies at the earliest to achieve 100% sanctioned strength soon.

The University at present has only a limited number of faculty members from outside its system, namely national/international. There are 9 visiting faculty members from outside the University. We aim to increase this number to at least 12 in the coming year. The efforts are on to invite outside visiting faculty - national and foreign, through ongoing MoUs with different Universities. These steps are being contemplated to promote international exposure of our students.

The University has developed a recruitment plan with emphasis on the following:

- Seek bright young Professors from around the world for the new Programs and nucleate a core group of young Assistant Professors around them.
- Seek established senior faculty to visit the University for limited time periods for teaching and research.
- Young post-doctoral candidates who would like to spend a few years doing research in India.
- Establish endowed chairs (for which funding will be sought from industry) which will carry higher salaries as also attractive research grants for exceptional faculty at all levels.

#### PART 1 VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

#### 1.1 Vision

To develop enlightened citizenship of a knowledge society for peace and prosperity of individuals, nation and the world, through promotion of innovation, creative endeavours, and scholarly inquiry.

#### 1.2 Mission

To serve as a beacon of change, through multi-disciplinary learning, for creation of knowledge community, by building a strong character and nurturing a value-based transparent work ethics, promoting creative and critical thinking for holistic development and self-sustenance for the people of India. The University seeks to achieve this objective by cultivating an environment of excellence in teaching, research and innovation in pure and applied areas of learning.

- 1.3 Objectives (as defined in the University of ......Act, 19....)
- 1.3.1 To disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional and research facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit;
- 1.3.2 To make special provisions for integrated courses in humanities, social sciences, science and technology in its educational programmes;
- 1.3.3 To take appropriate measures for promoting innovations in teaching-learning process and inter-disciplinary studies and research;
- 1.3.4 To educate and train manpower for the development of the country;
- 1.3.5 To establish linkages with industries for the promotion of science and technology;
- 1.3.6 To pay special attention to the improvement of the social and economic conditions and welfare of the people, their intellectual, academic and cultural development.

# PART 2 EXERCISE OF ENHANCED AUTONOMY AND DELEGATION OF FINANCIAL POWERS

- 2.1 All such powers are available to the Executive Council (EC) of the University as are provided for by the Act and Statutes as well as ordinances framed thereunder. The Executive Council (EC) shall not use its power to lay down any policy has an overriding or overruling impact on the University's Act.
- 2.2 The University shall endeavour to ensure gradual annual increase in the user charges / fees charged by it for its various courses and facilities.
- 2.3 The University shall strictly follow the General Financial Rules, 2017 issued by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance, and Government of India in all its financial transactions including procurement of goods and services.
- 2.4 The University shall adopt the Public Financial Management System (PFMS) for receipt of all funds from UGC / Government of India and make all payments through the PFMS till the last mile as far as possible.

- 2.5 The University shall send to the Ministry of Education and UGC any information required by it to satisfy any requirement related to Parliamentary Matters, RTI, Court Cases, Public Grievances or inputs to policy decision to be taken by the UGC/ Ministry of Education within reasonable time specified by the UGC/ Ministry of Education.
- 2.6 In addition to the above, such decision which creates financial liabilities on UGC/ Ministry of Education shall be taken up by the University with the prior approval of UGC / Ministry of Education.
- 2.7. In fulfilment of its obligations under the MoU, the University shall undertake to achieve certain level of performance for the year 2021-22. The performance will be assessed based on the information provided by the University as per the criteria listed in the **Annexure** enclosed.

### PART 3 FACILITATION /ASSISTANCE FROM THE GOVERNMENT/UGC

- 3.1. The University has made the commitment of Performance Evaluation Targets based on certain assumptions in respect of release of grants from Government/ UGC and raising from other resources, including loan from HEFA for expansion of infrastructural facilities, which has a direct bearing on the performance of the University committed in this MoU.
- 3.2. UGC/ Ministry of Education will extend any other facilitation assistance like taking up the matters with the State Government concerned or any Ministry/ Department of the Union Government, as and when required.

# PART 4 ACTION PLAN FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING OF THE MoU

- 4.1 Performance evaluation against these MoU parameters shall be carried out every six months and monitored by the University in the format annexed herewith.
- 4.2 The performance evaluation so carried out shall be submitted to the Executive Council (EC) of the University during the EC meetings for consideration.

- After the EC meeting, the same shall be sent to UGC along with its recommendations.
- 4.3 A joint review by the University, UGC and Ministry of Education shall be carried out within 180 days of completion of the financial year. The result of the joint review shall be placed before the EC and hosted prominently on the website of the University. The UGC will also review the performance of the departments created during last 3 years in the University
